WRITING TRANSITIONS

A **transition** is a word or phrase that connects one idea to another. This can occur within a paragraph or between paragraphs. Transitions are used to show how sentences or paragraphs are related to each other and how they relate to the overall theme.

- Transitions within a paragraph show the connections between two sentences.
- Transitions between paragraphs highlight key information from one paragraph to the next and helps create a logical flow between ideas.
